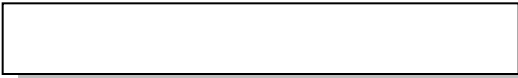

Case History:

The preliminary case history is essential in order to discover the grounds on which your case will be studied. Please understand that a simple YES or NO will not be enough in most of the cases. We kindly ask that you explain your answers. With the information you have provided, we will draft an official Petition. In some cases, the Tribunal Personnel will contact the other party before the petition is accepted to see if he/she wants to participate in the process. Depending on the participation of the other party, the tribunal will decide what course of action and what procedure will be used on your case.

Witnesses:

Church law requires not only the statements of the parties but the testimony of trustworthy and informed witnesses. Please list the names of at least **three** persons who are willing to give information regarding your marriage and **who have consented** to be interviewed. The best witnesses by far are people who knew you both during your courtship and/or in the early part of your marriage. They may be relatives as well as close friends. The witnesses you name do not have to live in Prince Edward Island. They can be interviewed at the Marriage Tribunal closest to where they live.

Case History Questions

Your case history should contain the following information in not more than four pages. An interview, should you agree to participate, will provide an opportunity for further clarification of the questions.

1. Before the marriage: When did you meet? How old were you? How long was the courtship? Did any behaviour turn up before the marriage that became a problem later on?
2. Was there any pressure on you to marry? Did anybody oppose the marriage? If so, why?
3. Who proposed? Were you both happy about getting married? Did you follow a marriage preparation program?
4. Tell something about your home life and the home life of your spouse. Was it happy? Were you given good moral and religious example? Where there drugs, alcohol or any kind of abuse? How far did you go in school? How old were you when you first left home? For what reason did you leave home? How many are in your family? Where are you placed?
5. Was your wedding day happy? If not, why not? Did anything outstanding happen that day that you remember more vividly than other events of the day? Did you have a honeymoon?
6. When was the marriage consummated?
7. What constituted the happy times in your early marriage? How long were you happy?
8. What was the earliest serious problem in your marriage? When did this occur? Describe this problem as well as you can.
9. Did you have children? Did you both want children? Did you agree to this before marriage?
10. How was your communication? Did either one dominate the marriage? How did you manage financially?
11. Was there any drinking? Drugs? Criminal record? Infidelity? (Before or after the Wedding?)
12. Did you live up to your religious beliefs? Did you go to church as a couple?
13. Were there any temporary separations? If so, who left and how often and for how long? Describe the event that led up to the final break.
14. What has each of you done since the final separation? Please describe if you have any issues related to the marriage/break-up after the final separation.
