Roman Catholic diocesan institutions in 1916:

St. Dunstan's College, opened in 1855 Charlottetown Hospital, opened in 1879 St. Vincent's Orphanage, opened in 1910 Notre Dame Academy, opened in 1857 St. Mary's Academy (Summerside), opened in 1868

Quasi-Catholic institutions on PEI in 1916:

- Notre Dame Sisters' schools in Charlottetown (St. Joseph's), Miscouche, Tignish, Souris and Rustico. (These were public schools but taught mostly by CND sisters and attended by Catholic pupils).
- Queen Square School in Charlottetown (This was a public school but by a "gentlemen's agreement" it had almost exclusively Catholic teachers and Catholic students).

Religious orders of women on PEI in 1916:

- Sisters of Notre Dame in many Island schools (above)
- Grey Nuns of Quebec, operating the Charlottetown Hospital and St. Vincent's Orphanage
- Little Sisters of the Holy Family, domestics at St. Dunstan's College
- Sisters of St. Martha, just beginning here in 1916
